

adult should have medical, financial, legal a n d personal information collected in one place. Items should be stored in a fire proof container in your home, not in a safe deposit box unavailable that is quickly in case of an emergency. Copies of



Medical Information

Every adult should have a living will or medical power of attorney should you be unable to make medical decisions for yourself. A family

meeting in which the details of your wishes are explained is highly recommended.

Prepare and share with family a list containing medical information including doctors' names and phone numbers, medications,

medical insurance, pharmacy names, and medical reports.

Keep a list of medications and your primary care physician's name and phone number in your wallet. If you use a smart phone, create an Emergency Contacts listing in your directory with the names and phone

Health Officer Steve Wielkocz (wheel-koze), joined the Fort Lee Health Department in 1977 and became department head in 1992. He is one of the nine people employed by the town for the various divisions of the Department, while the positions of Animal Control Officer and part-time nurse are contracted out.

The Health Department provides residents of Fort Lee many services, including free health programs, and runs the Division of Vital Statistics, which handles licensing of pets and issuance of



Riser Replacement Underway

The riser pipe replacement project is now underway in Building 5. The old, rusted-out risers that provide water for the heating and cooling systems are being removed. The pipes are being replaced two at a time, and there are a total of 16 in each tower. For winter heating, affected apartments have been provided high quality electric space heaters. Apartments affected in the summer will be provided freestanding air conditioning units. Removal of the first batch of old black iron pipe began in February, with installation of new copper piping and insulation to follow, once each old riser is removed. The riser replacement project for Buildings 5 and 6 will take approximately three

Bag the Light Stuff

Because outside air enters the trash chutes and tends to cause an updraft, it is very important that all loose materials be properly bagged before being inserted into the chute. This prevents light items from being blown upward and outward. Light items like kitty litter, shredded paper, styrofoam nuggets, and anything else that may become airborne due to air movement should be bagged and tied prior to being disposed of in the trash chute.

Diggerland is a construction-themed adventure park where children and families can drive, ride and operate actual machinery.

The park, in West Berlin, NJ is approximately two hours from Fort Lee and has of over 25 attractions, including real, diesel powered, full size, pieces of construction equipment like excavators, dump trucks, backhoes and more. Each machine has undergone advanced engineering modifications which make them safe for the public, allowing children as small as 36" to operate with little to no

Along with operating heavy machinery, Diggerland guests can climb a rope course, tackle a rock wall, or visit the video arcade. Heavy machinery stunt shows are performed daily by the park's operating team.

Diggerland is appropriate for children who are at least 36" tall, though some rides require a height of 42". Children under 36" height are free to enter the park, however they will not be able to participate in most activities. There are limited areas geared to the younger set, including a playground and the arcade.

The Park opens for the season on March 17 and is open on weekends until June 13, when it opens daily. Pricing is \$29.95 for kids between 36" and 42", \$34.95 for those above. Getting there: Event location is a few blocks from the mid-town Port Authority Bus Terminal in NYC. See Tricks of the Commuting Trade (below) for a variety of ways to get into the city.

Tricks of the Commuting Trade



Long-time Horizon House residents who have commuted to the city for many years have developed their own particular tricks of the commuting trade that get them into and out of The Big Apple as quickly and

efficiently as possible. *HorizoNews* has compiled a list of commuting tips for those of our readers who may not have lived here quite as long, because you never know when you can learn a new trick!

Simplest bus method: You can take NJ Transit bus #156 (local) or #156R (express), which stop on Palisade Avenue at Horizon Road, in front of Hiram's. The express buses tend to be clustered around the rush hours, but there are exceptions, like the 2:15 PM

156R from the mid-town Port Authority terminal to Fort Lee. Figure 40 to 50 minutes on the express, depending on traffic, and around an hour+ on the local.

Don't mind walking a few blocks? The #159 (local) and #159R (express) stop at Anderson Avenue and Forest Road and run frequently, actually, more frequently than the 156. The ride takes about the same amount of time as the 156, and add on around 10 minutes for the walk to or from Anderson.

Both routes into the city are 3-zone NJ transit rides, which cost \$4.50 (or \$ 4.25 if you purchase a 10-pack). For children 6 and up and seniors 62 and over, the fare is \$2.05. Seniors must show proof of age. Disabled riders can also pay the reduced fares. Google "NJ Transit Reduced Fare Program" for more information.

Prefer to go over the bridge into Manhattan? Then there's the #181 to the recently renovated George Washington Bridge bus terminal. You can pick up the 181 on the east side of Horizon Road, where you'd normally get off the 156 when coming home. The big problem with the 181 is its infrequent schedule, just a few buses, mainly clustered around rush hours. You can also take it home and get off in front of Hiram's. The 181 costs \$3.50 or \$1.55 for children and seniors. Of course, you can take any NJ transit bus to the Jersey side of the bridge and proceed from there. The ride from Horizon House to the bridge is \$2.55 or \$1.10 for children and seniors.

If you really dislike looking at old fashioned bus schedules, you can obtain all scheduling information at www.njtransit.com. And note that up to two children ages 5-11 ride free with a fare-paying passenger on weekends and holidays; children 4 and under always ride free.

New Jersey Transit's My Bus Now tracker does a pretty good job of letting you know when the next bus is coming. You can get it here: mybusnow.njtransit.com. You can enter the bus stop number and find out which buses are on their way. For instance, the number for the stop on Palisade Avenue in front of Hiram's is 11917. The one on Anderson and Forest Rd, in the direction of NYC, is 11844 and the Horizon House stop on the east side of Palisade Avenue (in the direction of the bridge) is 11913. There is

also a text-to-phone service. Instructions for that are on the sign at each bus stop. Simply text the stop number to 69287.

Another popular option, if you like exercise, is to walk to the bridge, then take any bus to the George Washington Bridge bus terminal in Manhattan. The walk to the bridge is around 15 to 20 minutes. Prefer to drive to, but not over, the bridge? If your plates are registered with Fort Lee, which they should be if you are a resident, you can park at any unmetered spot for up to 48 hours. There are quite a few streets within a few blocks of the bridge that are unmetered.

Besides taking a bus over the bridge, which runs from \$1.75 to \$2.00, depending on which bus line picks you up (\$.85 for children/seniors on NJ Transit), you can — if you don't mind riding with strangers — get over the bridge for free with one of the many drivers who line up at the Bridge Plaza bus stop to pick up passengers. They do this to save money on their toll due to the steep discount they will get using the carpool rate when there are three or more passengers in the car.

Once in Manhattan, you can use the connecting tunnel below the bus terminal to pick up the A train at its 175 St. stop. You can take the A one stop to 168 St. if you need to transfer to the #1 train or just walk a few

blocks from the bus terminal to pick up the #1 at its 181 St. stop. Reverse the process on your way home. All the buses that depart from the GWB bus station make their first stop at Bridge Plaza in Fort Lee. (There are no free carpool pickups on the Manhattan side, as there's no toll to get into New Jersey.)

Prefer the ferry? There's always the New York Waterway service in Weehawken. You can take the 156R bus (as above) and get off at Port Imperial or, during rush hours, take a free shuttle bus down to the Edgewater Ferry Landing. The shuttle is operated by the Fort Lee Parking Authority and the schedule is available here: fortleeparkingauthority.org/free-bus-

transportation. More information on New York Waterway ferries is available at: www.nywaterway.com.

One final idea for those who prefer to drive: Set up a carpool with friends or neighbors. Advertise in the *HorizoNews* classifieds, put up a note in your laundry room, or just organize by word of mouth. And for those who love to exercise, you can always bike to work... or walk, if you have the time!



Legal Documents

Have an attorney prepare a will and legal power of attorney. The latter is designated to act upon your behalf if you are incapacitated.

Make a list containing information about locations of banks, name of accountant, lawyer, broker, insurance agent, and credit cards. You might want to add the signature of a family member to your checking account so they can pay your bills if needed.

Personal Records

Have available vital statistics such as date and place of birth, marriage certificate, military service record, etc.

Make a list of family and friends and their phone numbers.

REMEMBER. KEEP INFORMATION IN ONE LOCATION KNOWN TO FAMILY.

Additional information on this topic is available online. And you probably will want to consult your lawyer.

marriage licenses. This is the place to go if you need certified documents of births, deaths, and marriages that occur in Fort Lee. For a marriage license, you will need to call for an appointment to apply.

In Fort Lee, dogs and cats over the age of six months must be licensed. Owners must show proof of rabies vaccination and there are discounted rates for dogs and cats that have been neutered.

The Environmental Health Department, a part of the Health Department, is available to answer questions or complaints that residents have regarding water and noise pollution, property maintenance, animal control, rodent control, heat, hot water, pool inspections, restaurant inspection, general nuisances and more.

Many health programs are available for Fort Lee residents and the phone number to call for appointments or information for any of these is 201-592-3500 x1510.

- The free Health Consultation and Blood Pressure Program is held on every 2nd and 4th Wednesday, September through June, 9 AM – 1 PM; call for appointment. Health programs for seniors, such as Matter of Balance, are available at the Richard Nest Senior Center. Call the Health Department for availability and program information.
- Free Child Health Clinic: No cost immunizations for children without health insurance, Tuesdays from 9 AM to 12 PM; call for appointment.
- Flu Shots are available on Tuesday mornings from 9 AM – 11 AM for a fee of \$15 and free for Seniors with a Medicare Part B card.

 Annual Health Fair: The Fort Lee Health Department holds an annual event in October at the Fort Lee Community Center which includes a variety of health screenings, blood work, and administration of the current year's influenza vaccine.

The Fort Lee Health Department is located at 309 Main Street, behind Borough Hall and is accessible from Center Avenue (turn left at Guntzer St.).

Hours: Monday through Friday, 8:30 AM to 4 PM (until 3:30 PM for marriage licenses; by appointment only). For marriage licenses, the Registrar is also open from 4 PM to 6 PM on the first Tuesday evening of each month. Call for appointment.
